With a dynasty rivalled perhaps only by that of her matriarch dog, Susan, who began a great line of beloved corgis, the Queen leaves some impressive feats behind her. There are, however, some lesser-known facts that underlie the Queen's most famous achievements, providing us some unique insight on the more personal life of Britain's longest reigning monarch.

The late Queen, over her 70-year reign, carried out more than 21,000 engagements, travelled more than any previous British monarch, and sat for over 200 official portraits- it is undoubtable that these are tasks that required great patience. However, she also proved to have unprecedented initiative by becoming

the first female royal to serve in the military, becoming a truck driver during World War II. In truth, she was perhaps most famous for the great moral support she offered (as a young Princess) to British soldiers and the nation as a whole during the aforementioned war, gaining her great and longstanding adoration from an entire generation of Britons.

What the future holds for the royal family remains to be seen. They have lost a great figurehead and the British people, in turn, have lost someone considered to be a great icon and role model. The Queen encapsulated the spirit of an older Britain, and for some she was a comfort in trying times, a reminder of what the nation has overcome- the legacy that she leaves behind is not one to overlook.


Coming out the other end

STONE Junction

Imagine waking up from an absurd dream in which the strangest things happened yet it somehow made perfect sense; that's you're one sentence review of this book. 416 pages of mind-bending chemicals, anarchists and a young boy who can go invisible: an escapist read if there ever was one.



'Stone Junction', often subtitled 'An Alchemical Pot-Boiler', provides just the right amount of whimsical magic, strange meditations and sixteen year olds experiencing teen pregnancy and breaking a nun's jaw. This bewitching novel begins with young Annalee, mother to Daniel (our wildly intelligent protagonist), as she escapes the orphanage that cannot understand her indifference to their oppressive methods of teaching. As we follow Daniel's awe-inspiring iourney through (unconventional) education. we are invited into the world of AMO, "a historical alliance of the mildly felonious, misfits, anarchists, shamans, earth mystics, gypsies, magicians, mad scientists, dreamers, and other socially marginal souls". He is taught by a multitude of more-than-strange teachers who go above and beyond to teach him the imperative lessons of life (at one point Daniel spends months in a desolate mountain meditating for 6 hours a day). Amongst the plans of plutonium theft, bomb placing, safe cracking and drug 'appreciation', a romantic relationship between Annalee and Shamus emerges, a love that drives her to do crazy things (see aforementioned list). Next up on Jim Dodge's agenda of crazy storytelling: a perfectly spherical (imaginary?) diamond that entrances Daniel and convinces him to retreat into his invisible world forevermore.

A psychedelic remix of the supernatural, crime and a stunningly touching fable of growing up, 'Stone Junction' reads like a dream, a very convoluted and frenetic dream. Read this if you'd like to forget about normal life for a little while, or if you're interested in learning about the restorative effects of black magic.

Warning: you will likely not know what is going on for the first 200 pages. Enjoy.
