John 10:1-10

This coming Sunday we will hear about the Good Shepherd and His Sheep. In this chapter, Jesus uses the metaphor of the shepherd and his sheep to explain to the Pharisees that just like the sheep, his people 'will not follow a stranger' and rather follow the shepherd who enters 'through the gate' and because they 'recognise his voice'. The passage is centred on listening, specifically to whom we choose to listen, avoiding a possibility of being 'led astray'. It contains an important message for us all, but particularly our young.



Recognition

uke 24:13-35

Often you might find that if you dress differently, or are out of school uniform, or in a place where people do not expect you to be, you might be unrecognised. In this famous post-Resurrection passage, two disciples are lamenting the death of Jesus. Jesus rising from the dead would be the last thing they were expecting to see. Hence they fail to recognise Him.

However, by spending time with them, leading them on a scriptural journey through the Bible and then finally revealing Himself through the breaking of bread as He did at the Last Supper / First Eucharist, Jesus revealed Himself to them.

Questions to Explore:

- Why did Jesus not reveal himself straight away?
- How do you think this encounter would help these men recognise the attributes they need to grow in?
- The men didn't recognise Jesus straight away. What does this tell us about human nature and Gods love for us?

French Exchange Y10

On Wednesday 29th March, 15 students had the pleasure of being welcomed by their French partners in Viry-Chatillon, a town in the outskirts of Paris. Our students spent a whole week immersed in a French speaking environment developing their speaking and listening skills. Various cultural visits were organised around Paris during the week to enable them to further their knowledge of Paris and its surroundings.

On our first day, students along with their French correspondent enjoyed an educational cruise on the river Seine viewing Paris' most iconic places such as la Tour Eiffel and Notre-Dame. On Friday, students stepped back in time with the visit to Versailles Palace and its gardens. Monday was spent discovering Montmartre with our French guide Emma, who exaplained the history of the neighbouhood that was once home to famous artists such as Picasso and Van Gogh. On Tuesday morning, we went to La Tour Montparnasse and enjoyed a 360 view over Paris and in the afternoon, we comtemplated one of Chagall's masterpiece, the ceiling of l'Opéra Garnier,

On the final day, students were able to spend the morning observing lessons in their exchange partners' school which was a unique opportunity to experience French education at first hand before getting the Eurostar back to London.

Teach SouthEast Internship Programme

Teach SouthEast offers a unique Internship Programme for anyone interested in finding out more about a career in teaching. Students studying a Maths, Physics, Chemistry, MFL or Computing related degree will also qualify for government funding of £300 per week; however, the programme is open to all applicants in all subjects and primary teaching. The three-week programme will run from the 19th June to the 7th July 2023,

during which the interns will have the opportunity to take part in specifically tailored training sessions in key areas of teaching pedagogy and practice, work closely with a subject specialist mentor, observing them regularly and team teaching with them, and have the opportunity to spend a day during their internship preparing for, and taking part in, an accelerated interview process for a training place within our SCITT (School Centred Initial Teacher Training).

Once again, Work Placement season is fast approaching. Thank you so much to all the parents, staff and local businesses for opening up their doors to place a number of our students in varied roles. However, we still require a high number of places to ensure that each and every Y10 and Y12 student has the opportunity that they deserve.

This is a great opportunity for students to participate in a quality work experience and additionally is an incredibly valuable part of preparing both our Year 10 and Year 12 students with increased motivation to study, increased self-understanding, maturity and self-confidence, as well as an opportunity for them to explore career options.

Abba Tribute Night



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
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
