Spanish Exchange

In May this year, Y10 and 12 students had the opportunity to participate in the Madrid Spanish Exchange. We are so fortunate and proud of our link with Salesianos Atocha, one of the 6 Salesian schools in Madrid alone. 19 of us signed up to the experience and we were matched with somebody of a similar age and correspondence was encouraged from January this year. We were asked to email regularly in Spanish and English to practice and to get to know as much about each other and our families as possible.

Between 3rd-10th May, Spanish students came to us first and they had a fabulous week visiting all that London had to offer as it prepared to host King Charles' Coronation with their teachers. They spent evenings and the weekend with their host family. We all enjoyed developing genuine friendships and we missed them when they went home. We then had the chance to visit Madrid during the May half term and for one week between 25th May-1st June, students stayed with Spanish host families. We received the warmest of welcomes at Madrid Airport and were thrilled to finally meet our exchange families.

As part of the trip we had the chance to teach English to primary school students, experience Salesian school life in Spain and visit various places in Madrid. Our visits to Plaza Mayor, Puerta del Sol, Bernabeu stadium and Las Ventas Bullring were among the places we had the chance to see. Our day trip to Toledo involved learning about it's beautiful architecture steeped in history and a cheeky Zip wire experience, one of the longest urban zip wire in Europe. It has been another great term on the environment front and Salesian School is getting greener by the minute. I will run through just a few of our recent changes below...

Firstly, we were inundated with responses from the Salesian Student Eco Survey - the brilliant ideas put forward are already being put into place for next year by the Eco Warriors so this was a great way to start the term. Speaking of the Eco Warriors - these brilliant young people have been honoured with the rather laborious job of labelling all the recycling bins around the school. This allows for more autonomy in terms of classroom teachers all having their own recycling bin which allows for recycling to be more seamless and fluent throughout the school.

Recycling has been top of the agenda for more than just the classroom bins however, with there now being official recycling points available for the following resources: batteries, pens and glue sticks. Statistics show that at least 9 billion pens are thrown away annually that could be recycled, and the statistics are similarly bleak for glues and batteries — if we can start by making a small change in our community then this will be a great first step. National Psychology Competition

We entered a team of five year 12 Psychology students into a national Psychology competition for schools held at Royal Holloway University. They had to pit their psychology skills against pupils from across the UK. The students were Alyssa B, Lois A, Tillie G, Caitlin E and Emily G. The question this year was 'How can psychology be used to understand the misinformation epidemic?'. The competition entailed students answering the question with a two-minute video (submitted before the event) and a corresponding poster (to be presented at the on-campus event). They had to look at findings from psychological studies and think about the implications of a psychological theory to showcase their understanding of Psychology.

These students were so impressive in their independent approach to the task and their confidence in delivering their ideas and theories to the judges. The judges said they were especially impressed with their enthusiasm, professional poster and application of relevant psychological concepts to the question. - *Ms Steph Court*





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
