Matthew 25:31-46

Matthew's Gospel focuses on the practicalities of the final judgement when Jesus returns, separating, as a shepherd would "sheep and goats" – the sheep being those who spend their lives performing acts of loving kindness and the goats being those who don't.

The overarching theme of Advent which starts next week, is, making preparations to meet the Lord. There is no better way to prepare than by serving people in need, starting with those who are right in front of us - as Mother Theresa often said. Offering humble service through hospitality, welcome, charity and accompaniment is the surest way of meeting Jesus Christ in our lives today.

21st Century culture, unfortunately, tends to glorify the individual. We however, are called to enlighten youngsters to the fact that the pursuit of purely selfish ends will only lead to dissatisfaction, disappointment and even dismay. Salesian School Shoebox Appeal

Salesian School Shoebox Appeal 2023 What a fantastic year for our Salesian Shoebox Appeal. In little over 4 weeks the whole school community donated a total of 154 wrapped and filled shoeboxes. The parents and staff also contributed to the successful delivery of all the boxes collected, by raising an astounding £1,232.00. This is enough money to send 410 boxes to the families, who without the appeal would not receive a gift at Christmas, nor be able to give presents to their family members. This means that we can give the charity more money to aid their fantastic work in other areas. This year the donations show the generosity of the Salesian parents and children as many here struggle with the 'cost of living' crisis in the UK. Yet still as a community the collective total raised is outstanding.

Students at Salesian School Chertsey have been collecting shoeboxes now for 6 years in aid of Link to Hope charities yearly appeal. The shoeboxes total donated by Salesian School over the last 6 years amounts to over 900 which is an amazing achievement! The boxes were collected Wednesday 8th November, ready to be transported by the charity warehouse in Worthing. The boxes are then distributed to poor families and the elderly in countries like Romania, Lithuania and Ukraine. Both Fr Kevin and I were amazed by the response from students in all year groups and in particular the college students who donated 42 boxes this year.

Some wonderful Year 8 and 11 students helped Mrs Bruney, Mrs Lightowers and myself, sort and fill lots of boxes. A shout out to Ted F, Cristina A, Maya C, Harry W, Mikolay W and Adelaide J who did an amazing job counting, sorting and loading the shoeboxes into the van. This helped the collection run smoothly, so thank you!

Music

It has been a very busy few weeks for the music department at Salesian, with lots of events and opportunities for the students. We currently have well over 100 students participating in various ensembles preparing for the annual carol service (on 29th November) and we have already seen some brilliant performances this term across a variety of concerts and masterclasses.

Battle of the Bands

On Friday 3rd November we held our annual Battle of the Bands competition. There was fierce competition this year as 7 excellent bands battled for the title, awarded by judges Mr Graham (Drama), Ms Welland, Mr De Quay and Mr Anderson. The event opened with the much anticipated return of the staff band, giving a floor-filling performance of 'I'm a believer' from the musical Shrek (...which may return later this year!), superbly led by their transfixing front man, Mr Graham, who whipped the 150+ crowd into a frenzy!

The real competition then began with 'George O and his friends' giving a picture perfect Oasis impression. Also featured were a number of Y7 and Y8 bands – 'Rogue', 'Misfits', and 'Electric Rock' – all performing classic songs by Queen, Keane, and Amy Winehouse with remarkable proficiency for their age. The GCSE students were well represented too, with '*The Revival'*, '*The Tardigrades'*, and '*The Outsiders'* getting the crowd clapping, swaying, and dancing. It was amazing to see how the students supported each other from the back, and wonderful to see so many performing on stage, or in a band for the first time.

The standard was exceptionally high, and the judges had a very difficult decision (with everybody picking different winners!) Following a curtain-closing performance by last year's winners, 'Linear Racers 5773', the judges selected 'The Revival' as the winners. A band that had undergone a number of guintessential band dramas in the previous week, this was a fantastic achievement and the Year 10/11s can now look forward to their prize of performing in a genuine recording studio. Lots of the bands are already planning for next year and we look forward to hearing them getting bigger and better over the course of the year.





Piano Recital & Masterclass

We've also been showcasing our pianists this term. Before half-term we had a wonderful evening of piano playing on the department grand piano, with over 30 pianists from Y7-12 performing. We had music from grade 1-8 and everything in between and it was inspiring to see so much musical skill across the school. We hope to see many of them performing at other events later in the year and look forward to seeing them build their skills as they move up the school.

Four of our most able pianists were selected to take part in a masterclass with professional pianist, Richard Meyrick. We are very lucky to have been offered masterclasses with Richard before and he always brings a breadth of knowledge and learning to our students. Orlando (Y12), Heather (Y10), Andrew (Y10), and Oliver (Y9) played impressive pieces by Tchaikovsky, Martinu, Milne, and Chopin. They all played excellently and took on board some challenging and constructive feedback from Richard. It was a fantastic experience more akin to music college than school and we look forward to hearing how their playing has progressed in the coming months.

Next term there will be an instrumental recital, house music competition for KS₃, and another concert for all our ensembles at the end of term. If any students would like to perform or take part in any music at Salesian they are encouraged to chat to their music teacher. - *Mr N. Graham*

School Improvements

A summary of some recent works carried out at the School and the College as we strive to provide the best possible learning and teaching environments for our students and staff:

We have carried out a partial refurbishment of the main hall at Guildford Road. The old redundant stage was removed and the usable space extended to increase the capacity to 300. This means that we can now have a full year group of 280 assembly within the hall itself rather than many of the students being sat in the catering area. Included in the refurbishment was an overhaul of the AV installation to provide a much better experience. We shall shortly be adding some new refreshed artwork to reflect what being Salesian in the 21st century is all about.

Over the road, we have finally had completion of our second sports pitch. This is the larger of the 2 pitches that have been created and will be used for 11 a side football and 15 a side rugby matches for both our school and college students. We played our first match on it last week which was an U18 Boys Surrey Schools Cup Match against Wimbledon College. Unfortunately the boys could not quite hold on to a 2-0 lead and lost on penalties but it was great to be able to play a home game on school grounds.

At both Guildford Road and Highfield Road, we have commissioned some wall art to brighten up areas of previously bare or tired walls. We hope that our students will take inspiration from the images and take pride in their school.





A Message From PE

With us moving into winter in the coming weeks, I am writing to encourage all students to be suitably prepared for the cold weather to come. This is after many students are still choosing to wear just shorts and t-shirt.

Students are encouraged to wear the Salesian tracksuit bottoms, ¼ zip top and navy base layer, along with the navy knee length sports socks as a way of guarding against the cold/ wet weather. It is also important that students do bring a spare pair of socks, either plain white socks or the navy knee-length sports socks. The list of PE kit that students are able to use can be found in the next column.

Compulsory PE Kit:

- Navy blue t-shirt with school badge
- Navy skot or plain navy sport shorts
- Plain white sport socks/navy kneehigh sports socks and shin pads (depending on the sport)
- Gum shield when needed

Optional PE Kit:

- Navy blue 1/4 zip top with school badge
- Navy blue tracksuit bottoms with school badge or navy blue Salesian leggings
- Plain navy base layer

The only other message is that even if students are ill/injured it is important that students bring their PE kit to lesson. This is to ensure that students can support within the lesson (Not necessarily in an active way) and have the ability to change into a clean, dry uniform at the end of the lesson.
