he Week Before Chi

his year the Church is blessed to have the final Sunday of Advent coincide with Christmas Eve. This will mark the culmination of our four-week preparation for the birth of Christ. During the Advent season, we have observed the liturgical colour of purple, a symbol of both patience and hope. Patience, as we await the fulfilment of the promise of Christ's arrival, and hope, as we eagerly anticipate the joy and peace he brings. Throughout the course of Advent the 'Theme of the Week' at school has regularly reflected that we are awaiting the birth of our Saviour. As a school we paused for a short while on the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, remembering the wholehearted Discipleship which Mary demonstrated. Something which we could all strive to emulate in our own lives.

On the 24th of December, the readings will remind us of the promise Jesus fulfilled. In 2 Samuel, the prophecy of a descendant of King David, a saviour to redeem humanity, is proclaimed. The Lord declares, "I will be a Father to him and he a Son to me". This promise finds its fulfilment in the Gospel of Luke's account of the Annunciation. Mary receives the divine message that she will conceive and give birth to God's Son. At the end of a busy and eventful Autumn Term, it is this message of joy and hope which makes being part of the Catholic community so special.

For our final day of term at school we will gather for lessons, liturgy and celebration (it is 'business as usual' for the rest of the week!). This will give the staff and children at Salesian a brief moment, at a busy time of year, to reflect and give thanks for everything that the Lord has given. The regular newsletters which you have received during the Autumn Term would have provided you with an opportunity to see some of the things that we have been thankful for. They would have also offered you a small insight into what has gone on inside and outside of the classroom. Unfortunately, it is only a fleeting glance into the day-to-day life of the children and staff at Salesian and what makes it such a unique place. Luckily, each day I am offered the privilege of witnessing students excelling inside and outside of the classroom and teachers living out their vocation and creating lessons that I can only wish I had at school!

Recently, this work was recognised through the school being ranked amongst the 'Top 10 schools' in the country. The school does not seek external praise, but it is wonderful to have the hard work of the community recognised! Year 13 Super-Curricular Day

21st November

Our Year 13 Biologists visited Royal Holloway, University of London, on 21 November for their Super-Curricular Biology experience. The day provided an excellent opportunity to work in a large university Biosciences' laboratory on a complex practical under the supervision of Professor Laszlo Bogre and a small team of undergraduate and postgraduate students.

The aim was to investigate how plants see and direct their development using photoreceptors using the skill of observation and gene profiling techniques. The practical work involved purifying DNA from three plants (wild type, cry2 and phyB mutants), setting up a PCR (Polymerase Chain Reaction) to amplify the DNA samples and then analysing them with the aid of a restriction digest and separation using gel electrophoresis. From the results and observations of the plants, students were then invited to explain their findings.

Students also listened to a wonderfully enthusiastic presentation by Dr Enrique Lopez-Juez on vertebrate

development. Within the context of evolution, this presentation, which also involved observing microscope slides, considered a range of animal skeletons illustrating vertebrate development in animals and nuanced their evolution.

This opportunity gave our students a real insight into life as a science undergraduate and students very much enjoyed the chance to see the university in action. This was especially appropriate at a time when so many of them are in the timeframe of applying to university in preparation for the next stage of their academic journey. - Mrs Moloney











Carol Service

On the evening of the 29th November, we held our annual 'Nine Lessons and Carols' Service at Christ the Prince of Peace Church in Weybridge. This concert was a celebration of Advent and Christmas through a selection of contrasting musical works. We were thrilled to have had just under 150 students involved in the concert, participating in a selection of five choirs and three instrumental ensembles. We were equally thrilled to have sold out the event, allowing the students to perform for an audience of 350 people, their family members and their teachers. We are incredibly proud of each student for their participation, hard work and dedication to the months of rehearsals that went into making each performance truly amazing.

The concert comprised of performances by the Junior Girls' Choir (The Time of Snow), Boys' Choir (Torches), Senior Girls' Choir (Christmas Lullaby), Scholars' Choir (Ave Maris Stella & The Waiting Sky), College Choir (Christmas Cards), Sinfonia Orchestra (Walking in the Air & White Christmas), Jazz Band (The Most Wonderful Time of the Year), Salesian Orchestra (Christmas Cracker), and the finale piece played/sung by everyone involved (Star Carol). The finale piece was a true showstopper, and a fitting end to a wonderful concert of musical celebration. The performances were beautifully punctuated by Gospel Readings from students in Year 7-13, Mrs Hibbins-Durkin and Mr Gower, which allowed everyone present some time to pause and reflect as we were approaching the journey through Advent.

The concert was underpinned by the importance of celebrating the many years of hard work that our Director of Music Rebecca Clarey had spent inspiring the students, and pouring her heart and soul into the musical life of the school through events such as these.
