A Super(b)-Curricular Day at Salesian A Forensic Science Workshop


One of Salesian School's initiatives for this year has been for every subject to organise a super curricular day for Year 13 students. Just before half-term, it was the Chemistry department's turn. When organising this, I wanted to make the day fun and engaging, as well as showing how what our A-Level chemistry students are learning can be applied to situations outside the classroom.

We were fortunate enough to have Pulse CSI come in and do a one-day workshop on Forensic Science. Our pupils spent the morning learning about different forensic science techniques, and their importance when working to ensure the correct person gets put on trial for a crime. They also got to practice taking their own fingerprints and footprints, as well as some analysing using UV light.

Then came the main event. In the afternoon, our students (somewhat literally) transformed into crime scene investigators – complete with white CSI uniforms! They had to work together and apply all the techniques they had learned in the morning to solve a murder mystery. Our learners absolutely loved it! They all worked together as a team, exchanging ideas, and debating as to who the perpetrator was. At one point, one of the groups pulled out a huge white (no idea where that came from!) and were mapping out their ideas to help their team.

Our students got really into the day and on top of that, they got to leave with a gift as individual as them – a key ring they made themselves showing their own fingerprint.

The day was a huge success. Thank you to Pulse CSI for putting on such a unique experience, and to our chemistry students – you did us proud! - Dr Potier, Head of Chemistry









Behind Bars Conference

Social Science

If you had the chance to come face to face with a murderer, what would you want to ask them? Our Social Science students had that very opportunity when they recently attended the Behind Bars Conference.

Students debated the effectiveness of custodial sentencing and whether it is rehabilitative. They heard from ex-offenders, who told them about the crimes they had committed and their experience of prison life and the impact this had on them. Students asked numerous questions and gained insights which they would rarely get the opportunity to find out about in everyday life.

From their knowledge of Forensic Psychology and Crime and Deviance in Sociology, students were able to reflect on the mindset and thought processes of these ex-offenders. They were also able to see how socio-economic and societal factors contribute to crime.

Students really enjoyed the experience and found it thought provoking - one student saying, "rehabilitation doesn't seem to work, this has inspired me to work to change the system!".

Eco Corner

Whilst in the middle of a busy half term, I thought I'd take this opportunity to provide an update with all we are doing as a school to minimise our negative impact on the environment and make the school a greener, and therefore happier, place!

Recycling of Key Resources

At the end of the last academic year, I noticed that our school was following the rather unfortunate national trend in which everyday school items (such as glue sticks, pens and batteries), were being binned where they could be recycled. Fortunately, we have made some huge progress in this area as these items are now recycled as a whole school. Students and staff are now encouraged to recycle these key items by bringing them to the staffroom and this makes a huge difference. In the first term alone, we recycled over 280 glue sticks and 324 pens (yes I counted!) and this shows that these small steps really do make a huge difference.

Travel Timetable

As our School and College is split over two sites, sometimes staff are required to travel between sites and this is another area where we have made some huge steps this year; staff have been given a timetable which details which other members of staff are travelling at the same time and this means that we really are reducing our carbon footprint as a school as more and more staff are starting to share cars.



Enviro-Lent

This Lent we have launched 'Enviro-Lent' and this is where the Chaplaincy Team and myself have joined forces to unite. During 'Enviro-Lent' we have an individual school aim each week and a student activity taking place for students to get stuck in. During the first week of Lent, our whole school aim is 'Caring for our Common Home', and hence staff are being encouraged to teach without lights on where possible throughout Lent and beyond (obviously student learning is still the priority and staff are told that if natural lights is not sufficient then they can of course use the lights). Throughout Lent there is lots going on: there will be a fortnight of 'Meat-free Monday' accompanying the obvious no meat on Friday, a 'Salesian Swap Shop' and a Salesian sponsored sleep out!

Our Enviro-Lent fundraising kicked off just before half term with a successful Year 11 vs Staff Football Fixture where just under £250 was raised — a great start indeed.

Maths Feast

Year 10

Raynes Park High School hosted a 'Maths Feast' competition for Year 10 students, one of dozens happening across the country this year, run by the AMSP (Advanced Mathematics Support Programme).

The school hall was fully booked, as tables were laid for a whopping 26 teams, who took part in the competition from across South London and Surrey. Eight of our enthusiastic and hungry mathematicians worked on a variety of problems and challenges in two separate teams of four: Lucy A/ Arthur B/Kai P/Chloe T and Grace A/ Natasha B/Franklin B/James L from Miss Peterkin's and Mr Garcia's classes respectively.

During the run-up to the event, there was much excitement from our students to be given the opportunity to represent the school, as well as some healthy competition between the two classes as to who would perform better! They had also been working hard by practicing rounds from previous years, which whetted their appetite for the day itself.



The day's menu included four rounds comprising physical tasks, logic puzzles, and challenging mathematical calculations, all of which provided the teams with a great deal of food for thought. Teamwork was key for each round as the students were required to work together, both as a group and in pairs, to solve problems, as well as deciding how to divide tasks up between them.

All of the students were a great credit to themselves, their teachers, and the school with their exemplary behaviour and ravenous enthusiasm throughout the event. Both teams achieved above-average scores on the day, of around 70%, with only one mark separating them from each other!




