We are incredibly lucky to have such a rich and diverse group of students at Salesian School that it was felt that there was a real need to properly celebrate all our cultures. This gave birth to our very first '*Culture Day'*. A chance to celebrate what makes us unique whilst understanding what brings us together, an opportunity to gain a firstclass catholic education. Matthew 28 v.19 says '*Therefore go and make disciples of all nations...* 'This great commission applies to all of us at Salesian School, and we have a real obligation to learn about other cultures to be able to truly fulfil this command.

Our Student Group decided that they wanted to do more to celebrate the diversity we have in school after it was recognised that we actually have over 70 different nationalities represented. When we are all smartly dressed in our uniform it is often difficult to differentiate. With this all in mind, our fantastic group of students set out to make something happen. The first thing students wanted to do was to encourage students to dress in the 'colours' of their culture'. On the day, 'the yard' was rich in colour and costume. Students fully embracing what their culture meant to them in dress. We had traditional outfits that enabled students and staff alike to have real conversations about heritage without fear of misrepresenting someone. There were so many conversations that were led with 'what do your colours tell me about you'. For me personally, it was such a privilege to speak to students who were so passionate about where they are from and what that means to them.

The group also wanted to showcase the number of bilingual students we have here at Salesian. To shine a light on those students for whom English is not their first language. To demonstrate the skill and talent they have in communicating on a day to day basis. They created a video of students proudly our Salesian Student Characteristics of 'Being Faithful, Dedicated, Aspirational Christian Leaders' in their first language. We played the video of over 20 different languages, from Punjabi to BSL, in Tutor to all students and staff so that we could celebrate belonging from all.

The next task was to find the link between what most commonly brings us together (our Catholic Education) and the theme for the day. This was to celebrate different cultures in lessons. Our access to education is what enables doors to be open for all of us in the future and to go out and truly build the kingdom. Salesian Schools are represented in over 130 different countries around the world, with Education at the heart of its mission. The students selected several different cultures to learn about and assigned each subject a country. In the first 10 minutes of the lesson, the students challenged the Heads of Departments to showcase their subject through a different cultural lens. For example, what does Maths look like in Japan? All students had a chance throughout the day to learn about up to 6 different countries through different curriculum subjects.

Finally, what so often brings people together from different cultures is food,

with the canteen staff putting on a spread from around the world. The early Church in Acts broke bread together as a sign of unity. Children and staff alike, dressed in the colours of their culture, sharing a meal with one another was one of the most unifying experiences. At the College, students cooked a meal from their culture to share with everyone, and what a feast it was! The Centenary hall was a buzz of colour and the most wonderful smells from around the world. A feast for the belly and the eyes!

Salesian Schools are a fantastic example of belonging around the world, and we are very fortunate to be part of an organisation that celebrates people's uniqueness whilst also proudly delivering an outstanding catholic education. I am incredibly grateful to the schools EDI student group who, without their contribution, the day would not have been such a success! Until next year!


Salesian Scholars at Dorking Halls

A particular highlight this term was taking our Scholars choir to sing at Dorking Halls as part of the Surrey Arts primary music festival. Scholars is our auditioned, flagship choir, singing more complex music in 4 or more parts, and they were invited to be the guest choir at the Runnymede festival on 18 April. The guest choir is there to inspire those performing from local primary schools, and our Scholars did just that, performing a set to include '*City of Stars'* and a fast, toe-tapping spiritual called '*Every time I feel the spirit'*.

The Scholars wowed the 600+ audience of pupils and parents and have already been invited back for next year. Year 10 Goes to Iceland

In the Easter holidays we took 40 of our Year 10 and Year 11 students on a 5-day trip to Iceland. The students had the opportunity to see some of their GCSE content on tectonic activity for real and had a wonderful time. Below is a summary of the trip from *Ella R* in Year 10. - *Mr R McIntyre, Geography Teacher*

On Wednesday 27th March I set off on what was unknowingly going to be one of the best trips of my life with so many of my amazing friends. Arriving at the airport early in the morning, there were a few people still half asleep but nonetheless ecstatic for the few days ahead. Once we got seated on the plane and took off was when the real adventure began...The first thing we all noticed when we landed other than the pungent smell of rotten eggs from the sulphur in the air, was how cold it was; but that didn't stop anyone from having such an incredible time!

Throughout the trip we took part in so many once in a life time experiences from seeing waterfalls, geysers and a lava show to walking on glaciers, in ice caves, and swimming in geothermal hot springs! In particular, one of the most interesting things we did was a tour through an ice cave in which we got to experience a pitch-black atmosphere where all lights were turned off and we stayed silent for a minute. In doing so we stood carefully, listening to the peacefulness and minute drops of water landing on the amorphous rocks surrounding us. I was very surprised to learn that Iceland has a population of just under 400,000 people, so when driving through the areas around Reykjavík there were breathtaking views of snowy mountains in the distance surrounded by vast stretches of land with almost no inhabitants!

I felt very lucky to be able to experience the Icelandic glaciers in my life time as they are a sight to behold. Other activities included visiting a volcanic beach, a geothermal power plant, and a virtual flyover of Iceland! At the end of our trip, in the early morning hours we unexpectedly witnessed an eruption of the Sundhnúkagígar carter row volcano, which was certainly a very special experience to leave our trip with and will remain a fantastic memory. Drama Productions

Year 9 students have recently performed a very moving production of Mark Wheller's verbatim play 'I love you Mum, I promise I won't die'. The play centres on the story of Daniel Spargo-Mabbs. On the evening of Friday 17th January 2014, Dan persuaded his mum to let him go to a party with a group of friends. However, instead of going to a party, Dan and his friends went to an illegal rave in Hillingdon, where Dan took MDMA (ecstasy), along with four of his group. He had no way of knowing that there was a lethal amount of MDMA in the bag he had, which was twelve times stronger than had caused deaths in the past.

The other four boys were fine, but whichever of them had had that bag would almost certainly also have died. It just happened to be Dan. The students performing were incredible at presenting such a mature topic as part of their PSHE programme, performing in front of the whole of Year 9 and later to a group of family and friends. The production was directed by Miss Welland who is incredibly proud of the cast involved.

We are really enjoying our rehearsals for the summer musical production of 'Shrek' and would like to remind you to save the dates of July 3rd, 4th and 5th for performances at 7pm at the college.









Exams

Year 12 students performed for their devised exam on Tuesday 7th May. As part of this section of their A level they study a theatre practitioner and perform using their style. This year they looked at Alecky Blythe whose work in theatre uses the real life words spoken by people to create verbatim theatre.

Two very different performances were created; one looking at the war in Ukraine exploring a variety of perspectives ranging from soldiers to refugees.

Children's Book Project

Dear Parent/Guardian,

This term we are collecting new and used books for the Childrens Book Project charity. We aim to collect 500 books that this fantastic charity can distribute to disadvantaged children across the UK.

About the Children's Book Project:

Across London and the UK 1 in 4 disadvantaged children owns fewer than 10 books, whilst 1 in 8 has none at all. This has an impact not only on these children's academic outcomes but also on their wellbeing, emotional development and sense of themselves as a reader.

The Children's Book Project directly tackles this 'book gap' and gifts donated books to targeted communities across the Capital. Over 500 schools, community groups, women's groups and prisons nationwide put on book gifting events at which children are invited to choose a book to take it home and keep. The charity expects to gift upwards of 350,000 books this year. The charity collects books for children up to the age of 16. 
Year 10 Maths Challenge
