Inter-Salesian Athletics

Finn Punton (Year 9) flew over the hurdles getting gold as well as winning the Long Jump and being part of a talented relay quartet who also gained gold. Eilish Mitchell (Year 8) who had never competed in this competition before, ran her socks off both in the 800m and the 100m gaining two golds, and Jaiden Smith (Year 7) who not only won the 100m and the 800m but despite never high jumping before, cleared the bar and went on to win the high jump competition also.

This was the first time competing for some of our Year 7 athletes in such a competition, they held their own throughout coping with the pressure and competitive spirit.

By the end of the day it was all to play for with single digit points between the 5 different schools it was the last event (4x100m relays) that would eventually give us our overall year group winners. The results were as follows:

Current position in school

Aside teaching Science, I am a Key Stage 3 coordinator and have really grown to love this role, building much of the structure from scratch is something I am extremely proud of. Paid Internships in Maths and Physics 2019

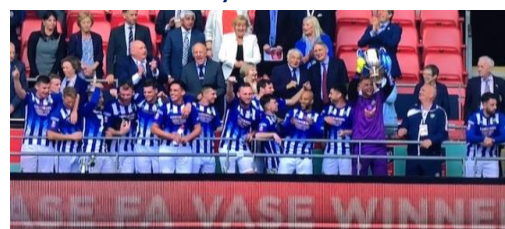
